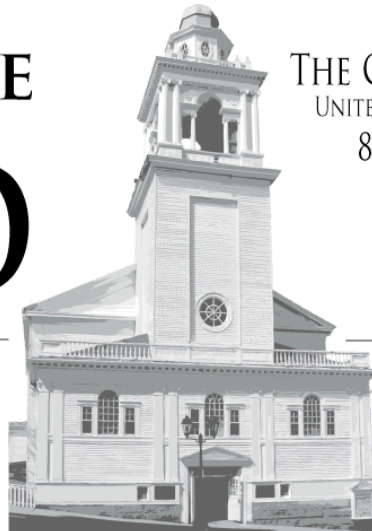

Dear Friends,

There is uneasiness to our times. I can't recall a time when just about everyone's conversation is centered on economic concerns. We are all disquieted by what is happening to our bank accounts, I.R.A.'s, pensions, the cost of energy, the rising price of groceries, etc. Now we realize that our's truly has become a global village. The economies of the world are precarious and the nations of the world are linked together in economic ways, if not in cultural and political ways.

The worries we have are genuine, to be sure, but perhaps our inadvertent realization that we are an interconnected world may have positive possibilities. The doors may be opening to the truth proclaimed by the world's great religions that we really are one human race and that we should get over the notion that we are globally defined by our differences. It is a shame, of course, that it may take money issues to make us aware that we are all a part of a world community. But, that may be an opening for us to begin to think anew about our common origins as a human race. Maybe, just maybe, we can realize out of economic hardship what we should have learned on the basis of our spiritual visionaries.

There is a hymn in our hymnbook entitled "Restless Weaver." (p. 520). We've included this hymn in worship on a couple of occasions. It contains much of the sentiment I'd like to see emerge from the current economic crisis, but now in terms of a spiritual vision of unity. The first verse of the hymn reads:  
*"Restless Weaver, ever spinning threads of justice and shalom; dreaming patterns of creation where all creatures find a home; gathering up life's varied fibers-every texture, every hue; grant us your creative vision. With us weave your world anew."*

We need a religious vision which is based upon justice and peace. We need to dream again of a world based upon the values of our common origins in a loving God in whose creation we are stewards of the earth not creation's owners. This vision will include a care for the earth, a zeal for ending poverty and injustice. It will include a brave attempt to give up prideful ideas of racial and cultural superiorities.

I know that all this sounds like the unrealistic dreams of one who may not fully grasp the realities of the world as it really is and always has been. I counter that we shall drown in a sea of greed should we fail to dream of a world in which God's gifts of life and love are shunned.

**You've Been Waiting, It's Here...Cropwalk 2008!**

At 39 years of age, the CROP (Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty) Walk is one of the oldest Community charity walks in the world. Created and sponsored by the Church World Service, a ministry of 35 interfaith Denominations providing self-help, disaster relief, and refugee assistance in 80 countries, CROP walk funds provide tools, from seeds to technical training and micro-enterprise loans, to empower the hungry to help themselves. And, up to 25% of the funds raised go to help fight poverty in our own Community.

The 2008 Plymouth CROP Walk occurs Sunday, October 26 at 12:30pm beginning at Zion Lutheran Church, across from the Cordage in North Plymouth. The Walk occurs along 2 possible routes through Plymouth, a 3½ or a 6-mile loop, chosen by the walkers depending on their stamina.

Last year The Church of the Pilgrimage was #5 out of 8 participating Plymouth Churches in raising contributions for CROP Walk. We all like to compete; Win for Good. Let's have a Friendly Competition. Let's increase our efforts this year to show the other Churches how seriously we view World Hunger by increasing our contributions. We could place #4 or even #3 with a little effort.
